University Preparation for High School Students

This three week program is for high school students who want to prepare for study at an American university.

Morning Classes (Daily)

Monday through Thursday, 9:00 am to 11:30 am

Home Room

- A “home-base” for students to check in and hear daily announcements
- Socialize and do team-building or group activities

Academic Listening and Speaking

- Develop listening skills and improve your academic note-taking abilities
- Enhance your ability to interact, discuss, argue, debate and give oral reports
- Expand your vocabulary and review grammatical structures
- Practice interview skills for university admissions

Afternoon Classes (Daily)

Monday through Thursday, 1:15 pm to 5:00 pm

Academic Reading and Writing

- Expand your vocabulary and ability to use new words and word forms
- Improve your reading comprehension and speed and gain confidence in your ability to master difficult texts
- Write essays for college applications

Test Preparation (*Two afternoons a week*)

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Learn about the standardized exams you need to take for entrance to an American university, the SAT and the TOEFL iBT. Review the components of each exam, and review strategies for success on each question type

Academic Coaching (*Two afternoons a week*)

Learn about the American university system and the admissions process, and improve your academic skills.

College Visits (*Every Friday*)

Enjoy the opportunity to visit a variety of American university campuses in the Northeast on Friday afternoons.

Evening Elective Classes

Choose one evening elective class in an area that interests you. Evening electives meet two evenings per week. Elective course offerings vary, but offerings may include:

- English Pronunciation
- Sports in the USA
- The Magic of the Short Story
- American Film Classics: Touchstones in American Pop Culture
- Current events

Admissions note

Students wishing to apply to the University Preparation program must currently be in their junior or senior year of high school. Sophomores (students who will be juniors in the fall) are not eligible to apply.

Course highlights

Prepare for undergraduate study at an American college or university.

Intensive English for College Students

Morning Classes (Daily)

Core courses meet Monday through Friday, 9:00 am to 1:00 pm

Reading and Vocabulary

- Increase your comprehension and practice making inferences
- Develop analytical and discussion skills as practiced in American Universities
- Learn to recognize rhetorical strategies English writers use

Expository Writing and Conventions of Written English

- Learn to write clearly and correctly in various styles of English
- Gain proficiency with the conventions of academic prose
- Practice revision and group review

Speaking and Listening Skills

- Learn to express ideas effectively in academic and professional discussions
- Practice comprehension and speaking with guest speakers, audio and video material, person to person interviews, and recorded journals.

Afternoon Courses (Twice Weekly)

Choose one or two afternoon elective courses to focus on your particular interests and skill development needs.

Other Fees

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English for Graduate Students and Professionals

For students pursuing a graduate degree or working in their profession, this program offers three areas of concentration:

- English for Postgraduate Students
- English for Business
- English for Law

Who should attend

A TOEFL test is not required, but you should be speaking English at an **intermediate to advanced level**.

Placement test

On the first day, you'll be given an English placement test to determine your level of study.

In the classroom

Classes are small – around 12 students – to encourage the participation and interactivity that builds language confidence.

GLOBAL SUMMER PROGRAM (GSP) CREDIT INFORMATION FOR YALE STUDENTS*

GSP Course Taken at Yale University

If you attend the GSP course at Yale, you will earn Yale credit.

GSP Course Taken at Another IARU** Institution

If you wish to transfer the credit in from one of the other GSP courses, the credit earned is considered transfer credit. Speak to your residential college dean and DUS before you attend the GSP course to discuss how and if the credit earned from a GSP course can be transferred as outside credit.

Some points to consider about transfer credit

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- The Director of Undergraduate Studies (DUS) in the subject of a course taken must approve the award of credit.
- You need an official transcript for the work completed at the foreign university. One may be sent by the school you attended to the GSP coordinator at Yale at the conclusion of the program. Check with the GSP coordinator of the university you attended. If you would like other copies of your official transcript, you should request one from the school before you depart from the program.
- A grade of **C** or above is required for transfer credit.
- The course must be at least 4 weeks long and must carry similar contact hours to that of courses at Yale.

*Students from other IARU Institutions should check with their university official or GSP Coordinator on the transferability of credits earned at Yale University.

EXPENSES FOR GSP AT YALE*

2012 Application Fee: \$55 (Waived for IARU partners)

2012 Per Course Tuition Fee: USD 3,150 (half tuition waived for two students from each IARU institution. Students will pay \$1,575)

2012 Accommodation: USD 2,994 (scholarships for half of the room and board costs will be awarded to two students from each IARU institution. Students will pay \$1,497 for six weeks)

2012 SEVIS Fee: \$200 (for those international students who need a visa to come to the United States. Students studying in the United States need to attend on an F-1 student visa)

2012 Health Insurance Fee: \$175 (For six weeks. Required for all international students attending Yale)

2012 Estimated Program Total for IARU partner students: \$3,447 (this does not include airfare, personal spending money, etc.)
